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This colloquium aims to see how modern preoccupations illuminate hidden aspects to ancient texts and how ancient texts can provide a fresh resource for thinking about, and surviving, modern warfare.

The devastating wars of the 20th century led us to say "Never Again" – yet for millions of people conflict, and its ghosts, are a fact of daily life. In Europe, we once more live in the shadow of struggles which, directly or indirectly, have implications for us all. We (re)turn to the classical world to understand warfare in the ancient imagination – to ask *how can we make sense of war?* How can we learn to live with the trauma it causes?

We all know that war had place of pride in Spartan culture but not all in Antiquity were so bellicose. Orators sometimes commended their populations to warfare but at others dissuaded them from it. Contemporary ideas about trauma can also be relevant to Antiquity: we can use them as prompts to ask how classical poets and playwrights grappled with the complex range of emotions that warfare stimulated, and how they explored its effects for soldiers and civilians alike.
